Strategic Decisions, Responsible Outcomes, Minimal Tax Impact: How We Closed a \$3.1 Million Budget Deficit

Dear New Hartford Community Members,

The 2026-27 budget demonstrates our commitment to student success, careful financial management, and a minimal tax increase for the community we serve. By prioritizing fiscal discipline and strategic planning, we successfully closed a \$3.1 million budget deficit without shifting the financial burden onto our taxpayers. Over the course of four months, the phased development of the budget in public sessions fostered a higher level of transparency and community engagement than in years past.

Budget cuts of this magnitude are never perfect, nor would we present them as such. Instead, my intention is to speak honestly about the work that brought us here, the values that guided our decisions and the outcomes that matter most for our community. While we pause to celebrate the implementation of our new pre-K program, the road to closing the \$3.1 million deficit required difficult decisions that carried significant emotional weight for our entire school community.

To reduce costs, we began by eliminating non-essential materials, items and programs. We implemented cost-saving measures within our health insurance plan, resulting in more than \$500,000 in savings, and made significant reductions in central administration, which included the elimination of two upper-level administrative positions and an administrative assistant. We also ended the lease agreement for office space at the Orchard (the former Gander Mountain building) saving us close to \$100,000 per year. Earlier in the year, we took proactive steps by eliminating the District's communications department as part of a broader effort to reduce costs. Additionally, switching to a centralized printing model, entering into a multiyear purchasing agreement with the Mohawk Regional Information Center (MORIC) for student Chromebooks, eliminating

underutilized software programs, discontinuing Connected Community Schools, reducing summer professional development and reducing materials and supplies helped generate more than \$1,000,000 in additional savings.

Lastly, to further reduce spending and close the remaining gap, we were forced to eliminate 18 positions from the budget. This includes the reduction of 14 New Hartford positions and four BOCES itinerant positions. Except for central administration and our BOCES itinerant positions, these reductions were achieved through attrition. The opportunistic utilization of New York State's universal pre-K (UPK) grant funding will preserve three elementary teaching positions and generate \$300,000 in savings during the 2026-27 school year. Three elementary teachers will be shifted from our operational budget (general fund) to UPK grant funding.

In 2026-27, we will run a total of 67 sections across the K-6 continuum, eight fewer sections than the previous year. With these reductions, we maintain an average class size of 19 students, with a range of 13 to 24 students per class. More specifically, our primary levels (K-2) will average 18.2 students per class and our intermediate levels (3-6) will average 19.7 students per class. While these averages, in isolation, seem palatable, they do not capture the inequity that exists across grade levels and buildings. Unfortunately, in a three-elementary-school model based on geographic lines, achieving an equitable distribution of students is challenging. This reality comes into focus given the financial constraints we must now operate within. While I understand these changes may be unsettling, please know that these decisions were made with care, awareness and a deep respect for their impact.

At the secondary level, we are reducing positions in Spanish, physical education, family and consumer science, and Mandarin Chinese. Due to declining enrollment, Mandarin Chinese will not be offered during the 2026-27 school year (only four students in 2025-26). We are also eliminating one teacher's assistant, a BOCES itinerant music teacher and a theater manager from the budget.

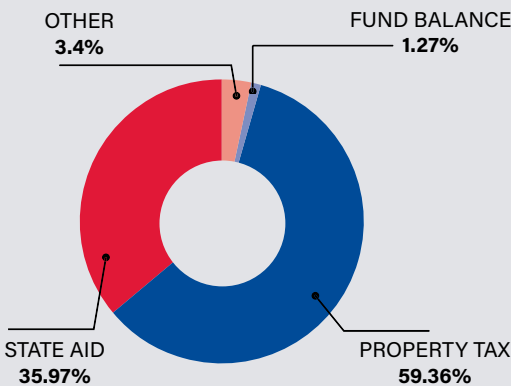
Class size is an important consideration, and I understand the attention it brings. I want to reassure our community that our students will continue to be well supported and positioned for success. New Hartford is fortunate to have exceptional teachers who consistently create strong learning environments, supported by a community that deeply values education. While our projected average of 19 students per class may raise concern for some, it is important to recognize that these numbers are not new to our district and, in fact, fall on the lower end of what we have experienced historically, particularly when compared to class sizes in the early 2000s. Historically, even with larger class sizes, New Hartford still ranked among the best schools in the state and was recognized with the highly prestigious National Blue Ribbon School Award. Class size is just one of many factors that contribute to student success, and in New Hartford, the strength of our instruction, relationships and support systems continues to make the greatest difference.

Navigating this budget process required us to balance difficult financial realities with our deep commitment to our students and staff. We closed this \$3.1 million deficit without shifting the burden to our taxpayers or laying off a single teacher or support staff member. At the same time, we remained focused on investing in our future. Implementing a pre-K program will provide early interventions for our youngest learners and strengthen the foundation of their educational journey; a meaningful step forward that will benefit our school community for years to come. The New Hartford Central School District draws its strength from the perseverance and support of its community, not from a budget spreadsheet. By navigating these changes in solidarity, we will continue to provide a high-quality education for our students and emerge as a stronger, more resilient school district.

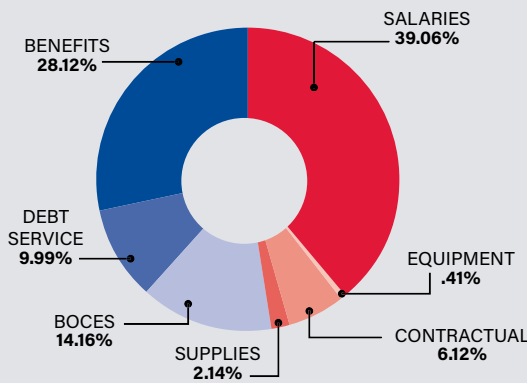

Voter Qualifications

TO VOTE YOU MUST BE:

- A citizen of the United States;
- At least 18 years old;
- A resident of the District for at least 30 days prior to the date of the election, and who is not otherwise ineligible to vote under the provisions of Section 5-106 of the Election Law.; and,
- Registered to vote with the Oneida County or Herkimer County Boards of Election.

TO VOTE YOU:

- Do NOT have to own property
- Do NOT have to be a parent/guardian
- Do NOT have to have children in the school district

Early Mail Voting and Absentee Ballots

The Early Mail Voter Act allows for early voting via mail without being required to have a reason. Individuals who wish to vote early by mail must submit an application.

Applications for early mail voting and absentee ballots should be requested by mail from the District Clerk, Kim Schweitzer, c/o District Office, 33 Oxford Road, New Hartford, New York 13413. Completed applications must be filed with the District Clerk at least 7 days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter. Otherwise, the application may be personally delivered to the District Clerk no later than the day before the election. If you are qualified for absentee voting and issued an absentee ballot, the ballot itself must be received by the District Clerk by 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election in order to be canvassed.

School Tax Relief (STAR) Eligibility

Under state law, all residential property owners, regardless of age, may receive a \$30,000 property tax exemption from the full value of their property, provided they filed for the exemption with their town assessor or at www.tax.ny.gov/star.

Basic STAR Exemption: A reduction on your school tax bill

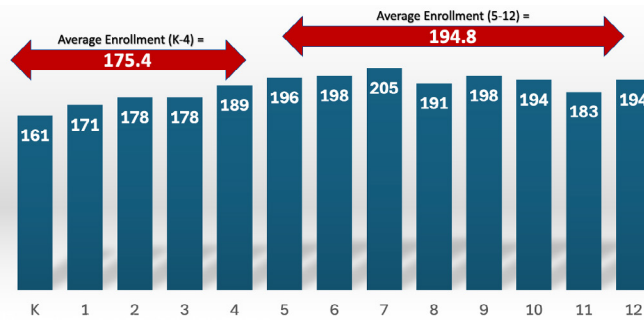
- > If you have been receiving the STAR exemption since 2015, you can continue to receive it for the same primary residence. As long as you remain eligible, you'll see a reduction on your school tax bill for the amount of your STAR exemption. **NOTE: The STAR exemption is no longer available to new homebuyers.**
- > Available for owner-occupied, primary residences where the resident owners' and their spouses' incomes are less than \$250,000.
- > Based on the first \$30,000 of the full value of a property, provided that they filed for the exemption with their town assessor or with New York State at www.tax.ny.gov/star.

Basic STAR Credit: A partial tax reimbursement

- > If you are registered for the STAR credit, the Tax Department will send you a STAR check in the mail each year. You can use the check to pay your school taxes.
- > You can receive the STAR credit if you own your home and it's your primary residence and the combined income of the owner and the owner's spouse is \$500,000 or less.
- > Based on the first \$30,000 of the full value of a property, provided they filed for the exemption with New York State at www.tax.ny.gov/star.
- > If you have filed for the Basic STAR (no age criteria), it is not necessary to reapply each year.
- > If you have not previously applied, you must apply at the appropriate town assessor's office or with New York State.

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2025-2026 Enrollment Trends: NHCS



Elementary enrollment has declined significantly over the past five years, resulting in smaller cohort sizes across grades K-4. On average, these grades enroll nearly 20 fewer students per cohort than grades 5-12, indicating a declining enrollment trend of 10.5%.

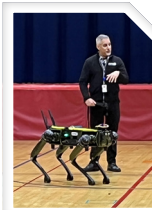

STEM IN ACTION

On Jan. 16, students in grades 4-6 at Hughes Elementary enjoyed a high-tech visit from Fluffy, a robotic dog from the Air Force Research Laboratory (AFRL) in Rome, NY, and his handler, Dr. Dave.

Dr. Dave provided a fascinating look into the world of advanced technology, highlighting the diverse career paths available in his industry. Students learned how teams of engineers, programmers, scientists and technicians collaborate to design, build and operate innovative robots like Fluffy.

The highlight of the visit was a live demonstration of Fluffy's capabilities. Students watched in awe as Fluffy walked, balanced and navigated different environments. Dr. Dave explained the critical real-world applications for this technology, noting that robot dogs are often used in dangerous combat situations to help protect human lives.



The visit sparked curiosity and excitement about future careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering and math). It was a memorable experience that helped our young Spartans see exactly how their classroom learning connects to real-world problem-solving and innovation.

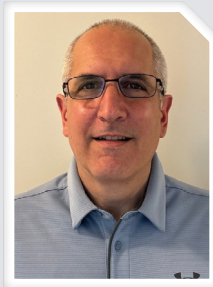
Board of Education Candidates

Two candidates seeking one open seat on the Board of Education

On May 19, New Hartford voters will elect one district resident to serve on the New Hartford Board of Education. The individual elected will serve a five-year term beginning July 1, 2026.

The board is comprised of seven school district residents, elected by voters, and is the official policy-making body of the school district. Board members are not financially compensated.

Voters to Decide on Bus Replacement Proposition

On Tuesday, May 19, voters will decide on a school bus purchasing proposition at a total cost not to exceed \$775,000. The state will reimburse the district up to 61% of the cost of the new vehicles.

The proposal includes the purchase of four 66-passenger diesel buses.

The proposed new bus purchases would replace five of the district's current buses, each of which have an average of 10 years of service and 100,000 miles.

The ideal replacement cycle for district buses is 10 years, when it is no longer cost effective to make the repairs needed to meet state inspection standards. Maintaining an aging school bus presents potential safety, maintenance and financial issues for the school district. After 10 to 12 years of service, bus maintenance costs increase by 10 to 20% and trade-in values decrease exponentially.

The district is required by the state to have enough buses to transport every student in the district in the event of an emergency, regardless of the number of students who walk or receive parent/guardian transportation to school. New Hartford buses transport approximately 2,500 students daily to 12 public, private and parochial schools, and travel 450,000 miles annually.



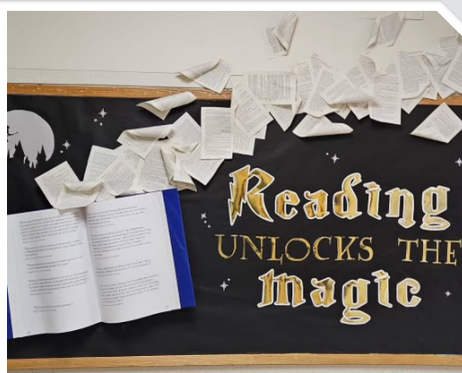
Reading Unlocks the Magic

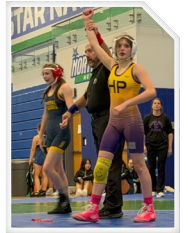
State Champion & 150 Wins

Senior Christopher Belmonte captured the 285-lb Division I NYS Championship in dominant fashion, securing his 150th career victory on the state's biggest stage.



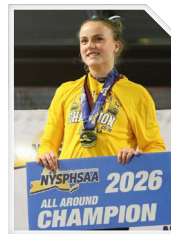
Wrestling Trailblazer

Senior Grayson Gall captured NYS Titles in the Balance Beam and All-Around, while breaking her own state record to cement her legacy in the New York history books.



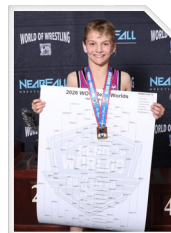
Elite Golf Selection

Enhanced STAR Program

- > Provides an increased benefit for the primary residences of senior citizens (age 65 and older) with qualifying incomes (\$107,300 or less for the 2026-27 school year.)
- > All Enhanced STAR recipients are required to participate in the Enhanced STAR Income Verification Program (IVP). In the first year that you apply for the Enhanced STAR exemption, your assessor will verify your eligibility based on the income information you provide. In the following years, NYS will verify your income eligibility. You will not need to reapply for the exemption or provide copies of your tax returns to your local assessor.
- > Similar to Basic STAR, if a taxpayer is eligible and enrolled in the Enhanced STAR program, they will receive the benefit each year in one of two ways: an exemption or a credit.
- > Based on the first \$86,100 of the full value of a home for the 2026-27 school year.

Senior Citizen Exemption

- > Seniors may also qualify for additional non-STAR Senior Citizen exemption. This exemption may entitle a homeowner to an exemption beyond the Enhanced STAR exemption.

Living Quarters for Senior Parent or Grandparent Exemption

- > The Board grants an exemption from taxation to the extent of an increase in assessed value of residential property resulting from the construction or reconstruction of the property for the purposes of providing living quarters, as a primary residence, for a parent or grandparent, who is 62 years of age or older. This exemption is subject to certain limitations detailed in Section 469 of the Real Property Tax Law.
- > Tax exemption applications are processed through the appropriate town assessor's office and Senior Citizens exemptions are tied to age and income.

A Gateway to the Stars

On April 16 and 17, the Myles Elementary gymnasium was transformed into a breathtaking celestial theater as the school hosted a portable planetarium. This unique experience, provided through the OHM BOCES Science Center, brought an immersive and interactive learning environment directly to our students.



The planetarium consists of a seven-meter inflatable dome made from specialized light-blocking fabric, creating a perfect dark-sky environment even in a fully lit gym. Using a digital projection system and advanced Starry Night software, an expert presenter brought the constellations to life, helping students explore scientific concepts that are often difficult to visualize in a traditional classroom setting.
